

How to Spot an AI-Generated Image: A Guide for Seniors

In today's digital world, it is harder to tell if the photos and videos we see are real or computer-generated. Advances in artificial intelligence (AI) make it easy to create highly realistic images that look authentic. However, there are some key signs that can help you spot an AI-generated image. Here are seven clues to watch for:

- 1. Perfect Symmetry: If an image looks like you could fold it in half and the two sides match exactly, it might be AI-generated. Real people and landscapes are not perfectly symmetrical.
- 2. Distortion: AI images often have odd distortions. Look closely at people in a crowd—someone might look strangely melted or stretched, like an oil painting gone wrong.
- 3. Unusual Proportions: Objects in AIgenerated images sometimes have the wrong size. For example, cars might look as tall as houses or doors too small for anyone to walk through.
- 4. Shadows and Lighting: In real life, shadows follow the rules of physics. In AI images, shadows might go in strange directions or look inconsistent with the light source.
- 5. Unnatural Textures: AI can make things appear too perfect, like skin with no blemishes or wrinkles. Or, on the other hand, textures might be overly detailed with exaggerated pores and lines.
- 6. Watermarks: Free AI tools often add a watermark to their creations. Look for logos or text in the corners of an image that indicates it was made by an AI.
- 7. Weird Details: Look for odd features, such as too many fingers on a hand, accessories that do not match, or faces that just do not seem right.

If you are unsure whether an image is AI-generated, try using free tools like AI or Not or AI Art Detector to check. Google's reverse image search is also a handy tool to find the original source of an image.

By keeping an eye out for these signs, you can better protect yourself from misleading or fake images.

COMMISSION ON AGING

HEALTH and WELLNESS Mary Hileman

Senior Monitoring Devices: A very informative presentation was given by Grace Farwell, Program Director at H.E.L.P., on Friday, October 4th at the Civic Center Library. The following is a summary of her presentation:

Life is Unpredictable: 1 in 4 people 65+ fall every year, 44% of adults 65 and older have a disability, 90% of older adults use prescription medication, 24% assess their health as fair or poor. 28% of older adults live alone or independently.

Do you need a Back Up Plan? An In-Home Monitoring System is designed to improve the health and safety of individuals living alone.

A Home System generally includes a base console and a wearable device (pendant, wristband, bracelet, smartwatch, etc.) An On-the-Go System just includes a wearable device.

Systems can be Monitored or Unmonitored. A Monitored System alert goes to a Monitoring Center and agents assess your situation. (You may just need the help of a neighbor or family member, or the help of the Paramedics.) An Unmonitored System alert goes directly to the Paramedics.

A Benefit of a Monitoring System could be a faster response time during a medical emergency. It could also improve the peace of mind for you, your family, and caregivers.

All systems include the basic response option. Several add-ons are available with many systems, however at additional cost. These may include Fall Detection, GPS tracking, Lock Box to access a key to your house, and voice activation.

Check with your insurance carrier to see if discounts for a system are available.
